

Frequency of VHD in Europe



- First valvular disease in Europe
- Severe AS: 3-6% of subjects > 65 years; 50% are asymptomatic
- Expected increased by x 2-3 in the next 50 years

The over-65 yrs population across Europe will double by 2060



ANNUALIZED GROWTH 2017-22




Definition of Population Aged 65 Years & Over

This report analyses the number of people aged 65 years and over in the United Kingdom. The data is sourced from the Office of National Statistics (ONS) and forecasts are based on ONS projections and IBISWorld estimates. ONS data is given as mid-year estimates which used for the financial year (i.e., June 2019 = 2019-20).



Putting Heart Valve Disease on the Agenda

- Only 3.8% of over 60s know what it is
- 54% of Europeans over 60 say their primary care practitioner rarely or never checks their heart with a stethoscope
- Leaving heart valve disease undiagnosed and untreated can lead to heart failure and death
- Up to 50% of death if symptoms and severe VHD not treated at 2-years



Cultivate a supportive environment

through community building, norms, openness to dissent, individual affirmation, and humor.



Prepare thoroughly

with attention to student identity and development, teaching contexts, subject matter, purposes, and methods.



Think through teacher stance

including pedagogical roles, positions on issues, and pros and cons of disclosing teacher views.



Communicate proactively

with students. parents, colleagues, and administrators about issues that will be studied.



Select authentic issues

and frame questions to promote student engagement and inquiry, progressing from cooler to hotter issues.



Choose resources and pedagogies

that challenge assumptions. include diverse voices and perspectives, and foster participation.



Guide discussion

with tools for analyzing sources, exchanging ideas, moving from small groups to whole group, and attending to equity.



Address emotions

by creating space for processing them, using de-escalation moves as needed, and developing self-awareness.
